

Resuscitator Is Gift *MARCH 16, 1951*

Fruitport Township Firemen Receive Lifesaving Device From Lions Club

Fruitport, March 16—The Fruitport Township Fire Department now has a resuscitator for emergency lifesaving use — thanks to the work of the Fruitport Lions Club. Purchaser of the resuscitator, the club presented the instrument to Fire Chief Murton J. Vandermolten at a club meeting Wednesday night.

The purchase of the new machine was an early objective of the local club, which has been operative for only a brief span of time, as one of its projects for community betterment.

THE resuscitator, which cost in excess of \$500, was purchased from funds which had been raised through the sponsorship of a carnival in the village park last summer, from a dance, and other projects designed to raise money.

Mr. Taylor announced arrangements are being completed for the return of the same carnival again this year. Albert Jones, secretary, submitted his resignation as he plans to leave the community within a few weeks, and President Taylor appointed Russell Kelly to complete the balance of the term.

Chief Vandermolten has received training in the operation of a resuscitator from Albert Lundwall, chief of the Norton Township Fire Department, and is now a competent operator. All members of the department will be trained in the use of the machine and will be qualified to respond to any emergency.

* * *

THE MACHINE is available for general use now, and persons seeking assistance of this nature in any emergency should call 2-2246 without delay. Teams of two men each respond to any call, and are ready to serve on a 24-hour basis. The new resuscitator is a multiple purpose device, fully automatic, which will serve as

resuscitator if the patient is not breathing, as an enilator if the patient is breathing slightly, and as an aspirator if congestion must be removed from the patient's lungs or chest cavity. Its use is indicated in cases involving drowning, gassing, electrical accidents, heart or asthma attacks, and severe shock of any nature.

Included in the equipment are two small tanks of oxygen, carrying 1,800 pounds pressure, and it is through this pressure that the machine is operated. A single tank will operate the machine for 17 minutes.

The Ramsey Piston Ring Company of Fruitport has volunteered to furnish all supplies of oxygen required for operation of the resuscitator gratuitously. The Lake Welding and Supply Company has also extended its services in supplying oxygen on a county-wide scale with 24-hour service on the same basis.

CHIEF Vandermolten stated the local equipment is available for use anywhere in any emergency and that no geographical boundaries will be recognized. The local department is ready to respond to any call and is ready to stand by to offer additional aid if an extreme emergency warrants.

Plans are developing rapidly for the purchase of an additional resuscitator to be placed at Station No. 2 on the Black Creek Road in the northern part of the township, and it is expected that this program will be completed within a short time.

Consideration is being given

the ultimate purchase of a light panel truck to be equipped to meet any emergency. Additional equipment will include a hospital cot, stretchers, blankets, first aid supplies, a pneumatic boat, and other items necessary to meet emergencies.

(NOTE: \$500 in 1951 is equal to \$4360 today.)

MCC seeking bond proposal by FAN staff

The Muskegon Community College is seeking a bond proposal for \$24,000,000 in a special election scheduled for Tuesday, November 5, 2013.

The estimated millage levied is 0.38 mill (\$0.38 on each \$1,000 of taxable valuation), not to exceed 25 years. •
